



Select Major Religious Observances in Academic Year 2026-27 (July 2026 to July 2027)

Members of the Emory University community observe many religious holidays. Below are the dates of select major Hindu, Jewish, Christian, and Muslim holidays that will occur over the academic year. OSRL provides this list to help prevent scheduling conflicts that could impact large populations in the campus community. There are many more religious traditions and holidays observed than are listed here. According to Emory's Religious Accommodation Policy 10.17, students and employees should work with their faculty and managers as early as possible to arrange for reasonable accommodations for their particular religious observances. Eid al-Adha	Islam	Eve May 16 through day May 17, 2027
Shavuot	Judaism	Eve June 10 through June 12, 2027 after nightfall

Muslim holidays are based on a lunar calendar, and the actual dates are determined by direct observation of the moon as announced by the mosque. Christian holidays also begin on the eve of the dates listed.
